MINISTER'S MUSE

Our Lovely and Infuriating Church

I have returned from a long and joyful holiday as I am sure many of you have as well. On some down time I had the chance to read a lecture given by Marilynne Robinson, the author of *Gilead* and *Housekeeping* on the Puritan foundations of New England. She did a good job of situating the movement in the wider context of the English Reformation. I was struck again by the foundations of our church which above all valued learning, equality and humility. I also believe that these values would be great medicine for the ills of our age.

The tradition began with the English Reformation with John Wycliff who believed that the Bible was something that belonged to the common man. The Bible in the fourteenth century, as it was until the 18th century, was the pre-immanent work of science, law, and literature and the cornerstone of European civilization. In 1384 he completed the first English translation which sparked the English reformation- together with its many peasant revolts and eventually the Puritan migration to the Americas. His translations and world

view were circulated widely throughout Europe and had a big impact on the Sixteenth century Reformation reflected in the likes of Luther, Calvin, Zwingly, and John Robinson.

The early Congregational clergy and statesmen of New England were among the most learned of Europe. The schools they created such as Harvard, Yale, Princeton and Dartmouth reflected those values. Yet for many reasons Puritanism has become a "straw man". Robinson, who is a UCC Congregationalist in Iowa, has done a good deal of study on Calvin, Edwards and others who deeply shaped our faith. As she compared the early colonial laws of Anglican states such as Virginia with the laws of Puritan states such as Connecticut and Massachusetts, the values of compassion and equality become quite clear. For example, Anglican states compelled its citizens to go to church. The institutions of slavery and aristocracy were enshrined. Death sentences were carried out for minor property theft.

Puritan colonies did not compel church attendance. Slavery was expressly forbidden except for conquest in war, and death sentences were far more rare. Indeed, compared with what was happening on the European continent at the time, New England was a paragon of liberality and light. Puritan does not

mean "strict and inflexible." It means bright, untarnished by the tyranny of the state, humble, and, yes, pure.

Our tradition also required great humility. Just as "a little knowledge is a dangerous thing," ordinary angry, despairing people can do great damage to one another as they brush up against the great fount of scripture. While he did believe that every person should read and study the bible, Jonathan Edwards believed that we should be aware of the idolatrous leanings of our own egos.

As the love and joy of hypocrites, are all from the source of self-love; so it is with their other affections, their sorrow for sin, their humiliation and submission, their religious desires and zeal: everything is as it were paid for beforehand, in God's highly gratifying their self-love, and their lusts, by making so much of them, and exalting them so highly, as things are in their imagination. 'Tis easy for nature, as corrupt as it is, under a notion of being already some of the highest favorites of heaven, and having a God who does so protect 'em and favor 'em in their sins, to love this imaginary God that suits 'em so well, and to extol him, and submit to him, and to be fierce and zealous for him.

Idolatry is the human tendency to make false gods. Today we live in a world less shaped by the Bible and more shaped by our secular and separate celebrities. But we would all be well served to pay heed to Edward's insight; whether we are agnostic, atheist or religious, people today seem to be largely unaware of the idolatrous nature of their own bias. We all look to the God "that suits us so well." Those with public ambitions seem to have little problem spouting their misguided and hasty rhetoric supported by their own fake news. I think we as a faithful community would be wise to exercise the same restraint and self control.

The rampant sexism, racism, homophobia, and shrillness of our age displayed in Neo-fascist demonstrations is immoral. It is immoral because of the definition of human rights set by the United Nations. It is immoral because it runs counter to the spirit of our constitution. But before any of these things, it is immoral because of its idolatry. When one puts one's own gender, race, orientation or ideology above the greater mystery of God there is bound to be trouble.

But everyone is prone to idolatry. Idolatry is a part of the way our minds are wired. In fact it is probably impossible to persuade anyone of anything without massaging it. Political partisanship is fine at a cookout or Facebook or Congress, but at a church we need to be at least willing to be open about our own bias. This is not easy. It is our cross.

Just this morning my family together with my mother in law from Colorado had made a plan to meet another swim family from Springfield at the MFA in Boston. I looked at my clock and thought we were late. I sometimes feel like we are a little vague with our commitments when we are on vacation, so I stormed into the bedroom and woke my wife with the words "Get up, we're late. We have 15 minutes to get ready."

"Were not meeting them at ten, we are meeting them at eleven. Why do you have to be so mean?" I had to apologize. I had become overly fixated on my own idolatrous notion of the truth.

Ministering to a church can be frustrating. Being a church member can be frustrating. I feel things like anyone, with passion and conviction. At times it can seem like everyone and everything is seeking to obscure the truth. And it is. And yet I do believe that we can speak the truth to one another as long as we are humble and gentle with one another. Carrying the light of the Gospel together requires apologies, mistakes and lots of forgiveness. Churchill said "Democracy is the worst form of government except for all others that have been tried." So I say of the church, the Congregational Church of the UCC is the worst church except for all others that have been tried.

Our Church can be a messy place, and it was from the beginning. But in the end it is the place where God's light still lives. And that indeed is saying something. Maybe someday we can all learn to do this experiment of civic life in America with a little more care and dignity. Maybe one day we can really stand for learning, equality and humility.

September 3rd, Communion Sunday Come to the Table

"Love one another with mutual affection; outdo one another in showing honor... Contribute to the needs of the saints; extend hospitality to strangers... Bless those who persecute you... Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep... Live in harmony with one another; do not be haughty, but associate with the lowly; do not claim to be wiser than you are... If your enemies are hungry, feed them; if they are thirsty, give them something to drink...

Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good."

Romans 12: 9-21

Jesus' lesson at the last supper was clear... the meal of the kin-dom of God is for all. Saint, strangers, those who persecute and betray you, those who are joyful and those who weep. The author of the epistle letter to the Romans reminds us and invites us to do as Jesus did—"do not be overcome with evil but overcome evil with good." In the words of Jesus, "take up your cross and follow me." This requires that we follow God's way in offering a good meal at God's table for all of God's guests.

September 10th, Rally Sunday The Table of Love

"Owe no one anything, except to love one another; for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law. The commandments, 'You shall not commit adultery; You shall not murder; You shall not steal; You shall not covet'; and any other commandment are summed up in this word, 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' Love does no wrong to a neighbor; therefore, love is the fulfilling of the law." Romans 13:8-10 "For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them."

September 17th The Table of Peace

Jesus often confounded those for whom acceptance was conditional—when it required making sure specific laws were being followed. This litmus test of love leaves little room for grace. Jesus chose time and again to seek out the intention of someone's heart—to gather together and engage in conversation as a way of moving toward right relationship. What happens when we seek to "do no wrong" to our neighbor, moving beyond boundaries into reciprocal understanding?

"Why do you pass judgment on your brother or sister? Or you, why do you despise your brother or sister? For we will all stand before the judgment seat of God. For it is written, 'As I live, says the Lord, every knee shall bow to me, and every tongue shall give praise to God.' So then, each of us will be accountable to God." Romans 14:10-12

"Then Peter came and said to him, 'Lord, if another member of the church sins against me, how often should I forgive? As many as seven times?' Jesus said to him, 'Not seven times, but, I tell you, seventy-seven times.'"

Matthew 18:21-22

We welcome each other at the table even when we disagree. Coming to tables of peacemaking is hard work. We must be willing to suspend our propensity for making ourselves the judge of others. Forgiveness is on the menu at God's table and we are called to sit down and find merciful ways to deal with one another despite our differences.

September 24th The Table of Grace

"I know that I will remain and continue with all of you for your progress and joy in faith, so that I may share abundantly

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION



September is upon us; soon the summer heat will be coming to an end and cool crisp air will be filling our lungs. God will soon be demonstrating an artistic talent by transforming our landscape from lush green to a vibrant autumn color pallet. The 2017-2018 Sunday School year will bring many exciting changes as we embark on a journey to discover what it means to participate in our sacraments of communion and baptism. Rally Day on September 10th will mark the official start to Sunday School Registration, but rest assured that Sunday School Registration is ongoing. If you are unable to make it to Rally Day you may register at any time.

We will begin our discovery of the sacraments by learning about the sacrament of communion. It is with a great celebration that we begin the year with the *Joyful Feast* program. This program will explore the Biblical background for our understanding of Communion, including the Passover roots of our Christian sacrament. As part of our program the youngest among us will be making the loaves of bread that will be offered throughout the year during communion.

The Joyful Feast program is a program written by the staff at Second

Congregational Church of Boxford, UCC and has been shared on the Massachusetts Conference of the United Church of Christ website for others to adapt to fit their unique programs. As we engage this program our children will be learning that communion is a celebration of Jesus' love. communion, we remember Jesus' love. Our children will gain an understanding that communion is a way that Jesus feeds us with his love. Our parents provide food for us because they love us. God feeds us with this special food, called the Eucharist, to remind us that God loves us.

The children will discover that we call this sacrament Communion because Communion means coming together, and when we share in this meal we come together as God's family. This is why we wait and take the meal together, as a family. Because communion is coming together as a family of God to give thanks to God by remembering what God has done for us, and all the world.

It is our hope that by participating in the Joyful Feast program the children of Second Church will understand that during communion we gather together as God's family. To give thanks for all that God has done, remember what Jesus did at the Last Supper, share what we hope for the future, and finally we break the bread together. As well as be able to articulate what they have discovered about the sacrament of communion during service on November 5th. The Joyful Feast program will begin on September 17th and run through October 29th. If you have any questions or would like to volunteer in our classrooms please contact Amie K. McCarthy.
