MINISTER'S MUSE

Embracing The Spiritual

Over the years of ordained ministry in a relatively open minded tradition, I have found over and over again one very simple lesson: Be aware of the Spirit and embrace it. Sure, we might need to unpack exactly what this means in our own lives, but I believe that when we do take the time to be with the spirit, we will find the North Star there shining, in you own lives, in the lives of others and in every organization we encounter.

At this point I'm sure some of you are wondering, why do I use the word spirit? Don't I really mean God and Christ? Of course I do, but the word spirit is no less helpful. Not only is the third person of the trinity but it is a word that people of all faiths, and even atheists, can agree on. At the very least spirit is the specific intention, or even organizing principle of a being, system or even an institution. Religious tradition has much light to shed in this regard even for a world increasingly directed by scientific insight and unseen mathematical logarithms.

The first step in this process is to become aware of your own spirit and embrace it. Developing a greater

understanding and a deeper embrace of our own spirit is not easy work. Many of us require support groups, faith organizations, world travel and even liberal arts educations. Everyone has a gift and a core of passion. As you become aware of your own being you may come to encounter being itself. You may find that who you think you are is not really who you are. You may come to a deeper level of acceptance and understanding. From the Christian tradition the fundamental understanding of the human being is the understanding that she or he is beloved and also one with creation. Paul Tillich the great modernist theologian of the last century said that our primary task in life is to accept that we are accepted. The light within you will become brighter and becoming the best scientist, guardian, artist, athlete, lover, spouse parent, grandparent will become increasingly easy. Instead of continually fighting with conflicting narratives of our self, we will see that really there are no conflicts, only strengths working together. Really we truly are our own worst enemies.

But this embrace of the spiritual does not end within the confines of our persons. We are social beings as well as individuals. But as we do the work of

discernment, many of us begin to see the process of spiritual clarification in others. Our neighbor searching for her lost cat again in our yard is working on a deeper spiritual process of discernment. The family in the stands with us cheering for their child is questing. As one of my seminary professors used to say as she quoted from rabbinical knowledge, “the eye of each person you meet is a window to God.”

But the spiritual is not reserved only for people. The spiritual is also in institutions. As my favorite biblical scholar the late Walter Wink used to say, “If you want to find evidence of fallen angels, look no further than a hospital that has lost sight of its mission statement.” Empathy stirs. We see that many organizations around us also have a spiritual DNA. Suddenly we feel the calling to help other people and organizations manifest their spiritual intention. We want our hospitals to be the flourishing agents of care they are trying to be. We want to help our police forces to better manifest their core principles of fair community policing developed by Sir Robert Peel in the early 1800s. We want our observatories and laboratories to better apply their scientific method. We want our schools to be paragons of child centered learning and we want that education to be acceptable to all. And the same goes for our faith communities. We want our churches to be God’s Good News, we want our synagogues to be agents of Tikkun Olam (the work of bringing God's sundered light together), we want our mosques to be manifestations of Allah’s compassion and mercy.

Too often we overlook the spirit in our own lives, in others and in other organizations. We get wrapped up in the arguments for and against before we actually deign to reach out and become involved. But when we begin to discern the role of the spirit in the world we begin to understand that accepting that your are accepted means helping other people and organizations accept that they are accepted and overcome the obstacles of achieving their stated goals. Embracing the spirit is a crucial part of the flourishing of a life and a society.

ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE

To clarify a discussion that arose at the 2017 Annual Financial Meeting held in March, I have provided the following table to quantify the extent of the “gap” between a sustainable level of Church revenue and our current spending levels.

\$160,000: The current level of funds provided by attendees via pledges, other giving, and fundraising.

\$105,000: The earnings on our endowment at a normal long-term rate of return of 6%.^(A)

\$265,000: The sustainable funding available for church activities.

\$360,000: The current spending base plus a yearly capital reserve for contingencies.^(B)

\$(95,000): The gap between expected sustainable funding and our current budgeted expenditures.^(C)

All these numbers are rounded estimates.

^(A)The Church, after expected capital projects for the roof and organ restoration, is estimated to have a remaining endowment of \$1.75 million dollars. While earnings and losses will vary from year to year, it is expected that the endowment will earn on average a 6% return or \$105,000 in earnings yearly. This represents the “sustainable” revenue the endowment can generate each year, on average, while maintaining the endowment principal at a flat level.

^(B)Our current spending has been budgeted in the \$350,000 range for the last 6 years. To that spending range, I have added another \$10,000 yearly as a contingency fund to be put aside for capital project contingencies. This capital reserve is less than what our average capital spending has been over the last decade or so, but we will have completed all significant capital projects requiring substantial outlays once the current in-process roofing and organ projects are completed.

^(C)This budget gap is the difference between what our revenues are reasonably expected to be and spending necessary to provide the current level of service to the Congregation and community. At the March 2018 Church Council meeting, the Council began soliciting volunteers to engage in strategic planning over the next 18-24 months. The Council is also arranging to bring in a UCC financial expert in April or May to help the Council better understand what level of services other Churches provide given a similar amount of revenue.


